ACADEMIC TESTING RULES

- 1. Students must bring a #2 pencil to use for testing. Answer sheets are machine scored.
- 2. Students are to write both name and school number on the answer sheets. The name of test being taken must appear on the answer sheet.
- 3. Any student currently enrolled in a Latin course may take any one of the following tests: Mottoes, Mythology, Roman History, Daily Life.
- 4. Latin 1a Grammar, Vocabulary 1a, and Derivatives 1 are open to students who are currently enrolled in Latin 1a.
- 5. Latin 1 Grammar, Vocabulary 1, and Derivatives 1 are open to students who are currently enrolled in Latin 1b/1.
- 6. Latin 2 Grammar, Vocabulary 2, and Derivatives 2 are open to students who are currently enrolled in Latin 2.
- 7. Advanced Latin Grammar, Advanced Vocabulary and Advanced Derivatives are open to students who are in Latin 3 and above.

8. Each test will consist of 50 multiple choice questions which will be answered on an answer sheet.

2) CERTAMEN

A team of four students from one school competes in a battle of the brains against teams from other schools. Questions for the Certamen come from all areas for which written tests are offered.

CERTAMEN RULES

- 1. There is one moderator, one timekeeper, and one scorekeeper.
- 2. A round consists of 10 toss-up questions and one bonus question for each correctly answered tossup question.
- 3. Each round has a time limit of 10 minutes.
- 4. The person who presses the buzzer first must answer a toss-up question without consultation with the other team members and must begin to answer within five seconds.
- 5. A toss-up question is worth 10 points.
- 6. If a toss-up question is interrupted by a buzzer, the person pressing the buzzer must offer an answer without hearing the rest of the question. If the answer offered is incorrect, the question is repeated once in its entirety for the opposing teams to answer.
- 7. When a member of a team correctly answers a toss-up question, the moderator reads a bonus question for the team. The team may confer for 15 seconds after which the team captain must begin the answer.
- 8. A bonus question is worth 10 points.
- 9. If a toss-up question has been asked and no one has signaled to answer, the moderator may repeat the question upon the request of any contestant.
- 10. If no one signals to answer a toss-up question within 30 seconds, the moderator asks the next toss-up question.
- 11. Any member who is unable to hear the moderator should interrupt him immediately. The moderator will stop, and when the acoustical problems have been solved, he will start the question from the beginning.
- 12. If there is a tie at the end of a round, the moderator asks questions until the tie is broken.
- 13. The moderator has the final authority in judging all aspects of the Certamen and settling any disputes which arise.

3) CREATIVE ARTS CONTESTS

DRAMATIC INTERPRETATION.

Dramatic Interpretation Scoring Rules:

Participants in the Dramatic Interpretation Contest must compete on the level of Latin last completed. They are requested to have memorized their passages thoroughly prior to their attendance at the Forum.

ENGLISH ORATORY

Contestants must write an original English oratory. The style should be similar to that of a classical orator. The subject is the theme of the convention:

"Apes non sunt solitaria natura." (Varro De Agri Cultura 3.16)

"Bees are not of a solitary nature."

There will be three divisions, lower (grade 7/8 and 9), middle (grade 10) and upper (grades 11 and 12). The student's oration should be three (3) minutes in length; a contestant will be

penalized 5 points if his speech is less than 2 minutes and 45 seconds or more than 3 minutes and 15 seconds in length (including introduction).

<u>English Oratory Scoring Rules:</u> Participants in English Oratory are requested to have memorized their passages thoroughly prior to their attendance at the convention. Judges will use the following criteria:

SIGHT READING

Contestants will be given a brief selection in Latin appropriate to the year of study enrolled: Level 1/2 and 1, Level II, Advanced Level-Prose, or Advanced Level-Poetry. They will be given a 15 minutes preparation period in which a dictionary, provided by the contestants themselves, may be used. Macrons will be provided on the selections to indicate long vowels. The students may make notes on the selections; no other scrap paper is allowed. However, at the end of the preparation period, the passages and dictionaries will be collected; the contestants will be given an unmarked passage to use as they appear before the judges. The students will be expected to read the passage aloud in Latin.

Sight Reading Scoring Rules:

Each contestant will be judged using a rating of 5-4-3-2-1 for confidence, continuity, phrasing, word accent, vowels, syllabication, consonant quality, performance, elisions (poetry only), and scansion (poetry only). Both Classical and Liturgical pronunciations are acceptable, but the contestant must inform the judges before performing if Liturgical pronunciation will be used.

1. The contestant will be expected to make a BRIEF statement about the costume and how it relates to the character.

- 2. The contestant must have knowledge of Roman or Greek clothing style and a broad knowledge of the character represented.
- 3. The contestant should be prepared to speak about the color, style, props, etc. selected for his/her costume.
- 4. The entrant must make his/her own costume. Creativity will include the entrant's imaginative use of materials to make props and costume; it will NOT be based on the oral presentation.
- 5. Cost: It is recommended that the cost of the costume not exceed \$50.00, excluding tax. For couples, this is \$50.00 per person. The value of all items, including borrowed items, shoes, jewelry, etc. should be included in the \$50.00 limit. From 2018 National Convention, participants do not need to show a receipt.

5) OLYMPIKA CONTESTS

Chariot Race

One entry per race (boys and girls).

The chariot must have two or four wheels, and it must have a handle for the rider.

Four people must pull it, while one student rides in the chariot. The rider must wear a helmet. All horses must be wearing long pants, no shorts. All horses must be wearing running shoes, no cleats.

The boys chariot race consists of 4 boys acting as horses and a girl acting as charioteer.

The girls chariot race consists of 4 girls acting as horses and a boy acting as charioteer.

Girls' and Boys' Frisbee Throw

Two entries per school. The Frisbees will be regulation size and weight and will be furnished by SCJCL. No personal Frisbees may be used. The throw will be for distance.

Girls' and Boys' Running Races: 100, 200, 300 Yard Races

Two entries per school per event. Participants must be wearing running shoes, no cleats.

6) ROLL CALL

Two students of each chapter will introduce their school in a creative way: skit, song, etc.

(Number of delegates from the school, name of the school, number of Sponsors, Chaperons, State Officers, way of travel -bus, cars, bicycles, etc.-, number of miles covered) There is a 45 seconds time limit per school.

7) SPIRIT CONTEST RULES

Each school will show their Spirit, one at a time. Participants can wear costumes but not use noisemakers. They can do chants, songs, cheers, and raps to promote JCL and Latin. There is a two (2) minutes time limit per school.
